Spring is about here in Auburn! Everyone is planning for spawning season and a busy summer ahead.


In this issue of *Newsreel* we introduce several new members of our staff, report on awards received by faculty and students, and sadly report on the passing of a former research associate and a former faculty member.

Kimberly and her husband decided to "move somewhere warm". They have family in Auburn and both were offered good jobs ... so here they are!




NEW MEMBER OF SWINGLE OFFICE STAFF

Brian Brewer has joined the office staff as a part-time TES employee to help us keep up while we restaff.



Terry recently announced that he will retire in October.


MORE USAS AWARD WINNERS

Her career goal is to become a curator at a research-oriented natural history museum.


PASSING


NEW USDA-NIFA GRANT



Rex Dunham, Tim Bruce & Baofung Su recently received a \$650,000 grant from USDA-NIFA to study growth, carcass traits and disease resistance in myostatin gene-edited channel catfish and hybrid catfish.

The goal of the work is to compare the growth, feed conversion, disease resistance, carcass yield and texture of gene edited and wild type fish.

Preliminary results indicated that gene edited fish grow very fast and have extra muscle fibers compared to wild type (see figures). Disease resistance is an important consideration because the myostatin gene in catfish is involved with modulation of the immune system.
