Hanna currently lives in Mobile with her husband, Austin, and cat, Ollie.




NEW MS GRADUATE

For her thesis work she will asses demand for red drum, crawfish, and oysters in southeastern super markets and restaurants.


After her MS program, Quinn hopes to pursue a PhD and work in the area of sustainable aquaculture.
